Trades Shortage

Where have all our tradies gone? Australia has a trade shortage. Trade enrolments are down in recent years. Parents may be encouraging their children out of trades and into university degrees in the belief that they will have more and better employment options.

There's a stigma that TAFE and other RTOs are poor substitutes for university. However, many university students drop out in their first year or finish their degrees with large debts and no immediate job prospects. The Productivity Commission recently released a report, which found that one in five university qualified young Australians can't find a full-time job in their chosen field.

Trade skills are in demand and tradies are paid while they learn. There is an aging population in the building industry so new apprentices are needed. Trades are not a "soft" option – many apprentices drop out in the first six months because they can't do the maths. Many are not prepared for the hard physical work. Some TAFE courses have direct links onto university.

Stop Your Child's Smartphone Addiction

Does your child find it difficult to stay focused on schoolwork while using the computer? Free and low cost apps are available to download for your device (computer, phone or tablet) allowing you to control what is accessed. You can block distracting websites, social media, games etc. for a period of time.

With some AppBlocks, once the sites are identified and time specified, there is no way of breaking free. Until the timer expires, you will be unable to access those sites even if you restart the computer or delete the application

Hope Christian College does not recommend any particular AppBlock but some that you may like to consider are: Self Control and OFFTIME for Apple, Stay Focused and Flipd for Android.

Growing Demand for People Skills

Advances in digital technology are changing the world of work. It is estimated that robots will replace more than 40% of human workers. The greatest impacts is for workers in routine, repetitive jobs. Increased reliance on technology in the work environment raises demand for more highly skilled workers, because the more routine work is automated. As the capability of digital technology increases, a growing range of tasks (such as data analysis and diagnosis) can be automated.

Although traditional STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Maths) skills are important, they are only needed by a relatively small number of highly skilled professionals. Programming work can be automated and sent offshore. As the capability of technology continues to develop, human workers need to focus on building skills that complement technology. High-level interpersonal and problem-solving skills are not easily automated. Despite all the hype about STEM skills, occupations requiring communication skills are actually growing fastest.
