MFS Road Awareness Program



On Thursday September 13, our Year 11 students had the Metropolitan Fire Service visit us to deliver their excellent Road Awareness Program (RAP).

The MFS RAP, supported by RAA, Motor Accident Commission (MAC), Adelaide BMW and the Australian Professional Firefighters Foundation, is a successful program presented by MFS firefighters in Secondary Schools throughout metropolitan Adelaide and regional South Australia. The program is in its fourteenth year, and reaches around 90% of students in the Year 11 level. Statistics show that road crashes are one of the biggest killers for 16-24 year olds throughout Australia.

Mark, an MFS firefighter, presented a hard hitting and emotional RAP where he gave our Year 11 students the opportunity to see the consequences of bad decision-making. His message was that through "concentration and common sense", almost all road crashes are avoidable. The MFS believes that if we start with new drivers at 16 years old we can create a positive generational change in driving attitudes, decision making and behaviours, giving our students the opportunity to reduce significantly the carnage on our roads.

MFS firefighters believe the road safety message is getting through to young people and there are positive signs of generational change underway.

The program took students through the realities of road crashes. A feature of the presentation was Yudhi, a road crash survivor, relating his experience and making an impassioned plea for the students to learn from their mistakes, and to speak up if they notice their parents taking risks when driving.

Our young drivers learned to be road users with good attitudes, make smart decisions, and understand that safe behaviour on the road is their responsibility. The students were inspired and motivated to be the best they can be on our roads.

With regard to uniform, the College seeks to present our students' uniforms in such a way that both represent Hope Christian College as a place of excellence in grooming and appearance, as well as catering for students' comfort and wellbeing. Parents are to ensure that their children wear the College uniform correctly.

As we approach the warmer Summer terms:

- IF the weather is hot in the last week of Term 3, students are permitted to wear their summer uniform. In the first two weeks of Term 4, students are permitted to wear their winter uniform if the weather is cold. Other changes may be notified via parent text or letter.
- As a Duty of Care, the College hat is to be worn for all outdoor activities during Terms 1 and 4. Students not wearing a hat will be directed to sit in the shade at Recess and Lunch, or they may be asked to wear a spare hat and conduct yard clean-up duties.

A man is said to have approached Socrates one day to share some gossip. The wise philosopher asked, "First, are you certain it's true? Second, is it something good? Third, is it something useful?" When the man said, "Not really," Socrates replied, "Well, if it's not true, good or useful, why talk about it?"

Gossip is a weapon of mass social destruction, designed to break and tear down an individual, friendship group or community.


What does the Bible say about dealing with gossip?

- Gossip ruins friendships. Proverbs 16:28
- A gossip can never keep a secret. Stay away from people who talk too much. Proverbs 20:19
- God's Word speaks the truth, so get rid of gossip before it weaves itself into the fabric of your everyday speech. "...stop making false accusations and spreading vicious rumours! ...Then your light will shine out from the darkness, and the darkness around you will be bright as day." Isaiah 58:9-10 NLT
- "Let there be no filthiness nor foolish talk nor crude joking, which are out of place, but instead let there be thanksgiving." Ephesians 5:4 ESV

We're all in this together. God wants us to help each other avoid getting it wrong and start living right.

A good way to stop gossip spreading is to ask yourself before you repeat it: "What's my motive for sharing this?" Even when you don't intend harm, your words can start a chain reaction that devastates people's lives and destroys families and friendships. And to the person wishing to spread gossip ask: "Have you talked to the person you're talking about?"

We learn from the Bible that we should "Be gentle, and patient, accepting each other in love..." (Ephesians 4:2-3 NCV) We all get stuff wrong and hurt others, so we all need this – why not start by practicing patience with others today, and loving them instead of gossiping about them?
