#### **TERM 2 FEE ACCOUNTS**

## Defence Force – Army Reserves

On Tuesday 4 June, Ray Chopping, Warrant Officer Class 2, Australian Army and two Army Reservists spoke to Senior Students on the benefits of joining the Army Reserves. Reserves join the Defence Force part time, while working or studying, which is a fantastic opportunity for students after they leave school.

There are many different job opportunities within the Army Reserves. Reservists receive free training and tax free pay. If you travel interstate or overseas on training, exercises or deployments, you'll be provided with free meals and accommodation. You'll also have free access to high quality medical and dental care.

Individuals must be a minimum of 17 years of age to participate but may commence the application at age 16.5 years. The process is started with an online application, then proceeds to an interview and medical / psychological assessment. There is also a pre-entry fitness assessment consisting of push ups, sit ups and shuttle run (beep test).

Sarah Hupp writes, "Did you know you started out as a single cell, and within that cell was enough DNA to hold the equivalent of 1,000 volumes of coded blueprints? According to author and speaker Brad Huddleston, our

children are becoming digital addicts. He says video games, social media and other online activities are highly addictive, and are having a huge impact on our kids' brain development and attention span. Teachers are desperate for help, and parents are in denial.

At the end of a tour of schools across Queensland, Huddleston visited our studios for a wide-ranging conversation with Neil Johnson, which we're highlighting this week in a two-part feature. In the first half, he tells us about the signs and symptoms of digital addiction, and how parents can protect their children.

The good news is that people are starting to recognise the problem. The bad news is that the problem is getting worse. "The openness and the receptivity were incredible," Huddleston said, "but what we found in our research, of course, is getting more and more disturbing."
