#### Understanding Your Child

'Teach us what we should do for the boy who will be born to us.' Judges 13:8 NCV

The following prayer was written by General Douglas MacArthur, a hero of World War II, on behalf of his son whom he loved dearly. If you're a parent you may want to use it as the basis for your own prayers for your children: 'Build me a son, O Lord, who will be strong enough to know when he is weak, and brave enough to face himself when he is afraid; one who will be proud and unbending in honest defeat, and humble and gentle in victory. #### PARTNERING WITH PARENTS Uniform Reminders for the Summer terms

Parents are to ensure that their children wear the correct College uniform and wear it correctly as they leave home in the morning.

As we approach the warmer Summer terms:

If the weather is hot in the <u>last week</u> of Term
3, students are permitted to wear their summer

uniform. In the **first two weeks** of Term 4, students are permitted to wear their winter uniform if the weather is cold. Other changes may be notified via parent text, email or letter.

- As a Duty of Care, the **College hat** is to be worn for all outdoor activities during Terms 1 and 4, that is, recess, lunchtime, brain-breaks, PE, outside lessons, etc. This is regardless of the optional seasonal changeover weeks. Students not wearing a hat will be directed to sit in the shade at Recess and Lunch, or they may be asked to wear a spare hat and conduct yard clean-up duties. Repeated non-compliance will result in escalating consequences.
- Girls' dresses must reach the TOP of the knees. Please check sizing now in case hems need to be lowered or a new dress purchased. When purchasing a new dress please buy one that has plenty of room for growth where a hem can be taken down in the future, so it will last longer. Also, the girls dress is NOT to have the **band** altered by taking it in at the back.

#### **SAFETY: Reminder of Banned Substances**

Parents and students are reminded there is no expectation of privacy with regards to lockers. As a duty of care, students are not permitted to bring onto College grounds such items as **spray deodorants, perfumes, liquid correction fluid, and high caffeinated or guarana energy drinks,** such as Full Throttle, Monster, Mother, Red Bull, Rockstar, and V. #### Secondary School: After Hours Detention

This year the Secondary School dispensed with the 'After Hours Detention' the following week as the standard practice. More meaningful and effective a consequence is the immediacy of an After-Hours Detention held 24 - 48 hours after the event, should the poor behaviour require this outcome or this be the next step in a process of helping an individual realise that choices have natural consequences. After consultation with the respective School Coordinator (Mr Penn in Middle School and Mr Lungley in Senior School) teachers are empowered to set an After Hours Detention by contacting the child's parents directly, giving 24 hours' notice. This detention will run from 3:30pm – 4:30pm, held in either the Library or Senior School Study Room, and be supervised by a School Coordinator, a Deputy Principal or another staff member. Should a student have a work commitment, they will need to work around that, or learn to be responsible in avoiding being issued with an after-hours detention in the first instance.

Examples of when an After-Hours Detention may be issued:

 should a student choose to wear their PE uniform on the wrong day. That is, when they do not have Physical Education, Health, Drama, an Excursion when the College has explicitly given permission for the wearing of PE due to the nature of the activity, Inter School Sport, or a legitimate reason given by the parents via a note or an email on or before the day (where it is clear the child is not at fault), • as an escalation of consequences after a continued or serious poor behaviour choice.

The College thanks parents and guardians for working collaboratively with us in helping train and develop the students in our care for theirs and society's future.



### Uni SA Mathematics Experience Program

On Friday 30 August, Cung Cinzah and Yeshaiah Varona attended the UniSA Math Experience Program at Mawson Lakes campus. These two Year 10 students were nominated because they demonstrated aptitude and talent in mathematics. The aim of the program was to encourage students to develop relationships with likeminded students from other secondary schools and assist students develop an understanding of mathematical applications. The program provided career information about mathematically based careers. Below is a report of the day written by Cung and Yeshaiah.

#### Mrs Fay Alford (Year 10 Advanced Math teacher)

The Maths Experience Program was fun and very interesting. We had the privilege of talking to and learning from professional mathematicians, including Professor Brenton Dansie, Head of the School of Information Technology & Mathematical Sciences in the Division of Information Technology, Engineering & the Environment at the University of South Australia.

The best part of the day was when we designed a bridge using 3D printing. We were put in groups of four or five and asked to design a bridge that would be printed using a 3D printer. It was then tested by putting weight on it. Although our team did not do so well, we still had a lot of fun completing the task.

The most interesting part of our day was when we were able to talk to some professionals. We were put in groups and every few minutes a different professional would come to our group where we were able to ask questions. We had professionals such as aerospace engineers and business consultants give us an idea of where maths can take us. Overall, the Maths Experience Program was very insightful and gave us a better idea of what maths can do for our future.
