## Hope Christian College Kings of the Court

The Hope Christian College Basketball Program rose from the defeats of 2019 to claim back to back Open Basketball Trophies at the SACSA and Northern Zone Basketball carnivals, both held early in Term 3.

The Year 9/10 team defeated Torrens Valley Christian School 18-9 in the SACSA grand final, the first time Hope has won this competition.

The Year 10-12 team then backed up and defeated Salisbury East High School 29-23 in the Northern Zone Basketball carnival.

Head coach and master of basketball, Mr Penn, and assistant coach and team chef, Mr Hutchison, set up the players to play a fast-paced, full-court pressing style of basketball. Waterbug guards (Lual, William and Paul) led the defensive line and forced turnovers in the opponents' back-court, while wily veterans (Kieren Wehr and Jack Morris) led the scoring and rebounding, and controlled the pace of the play. Ethan, 'the microwave' Jackson came off the bench as a scoring 6th man and carried the bench unit with his broad shoulders and his patented pump-fake layups. Vanya Zupanic had the most fouls, which was to be expected because Vanya is a foul magnet. ## Mobile Phones

Thank you to the vast majority of students who comply with the College's Mobile Phone Policy and turn their mobile phones off the moment they enter the College gates and keep them out of sight the whole of the day
until they leave the College gates. We really appreciate your compliance and support of College Policies which is expected.

For others who do not comply, 'Tough Love Consequences' now mean that any student who has their phone on or visible can expect it to be confiscated and be being issued with an After-Hours Detention from 3:30pm $-4: 30 \mathrm{pm}$ at the earliest convenience. This has been in the SEQTA notices for students and parents to read recently. Further breaches will result in escalated consequences to help the student learn to comply and make the correct choices. Phone use at school is not necessary and parents are asked to keep their child's phone at home unless they need it for safety reasons when travelling to and/or from the College.

## Uniform

A polite reminder that it is the responsibility of students to know the Uniform Policy and abide by it. As a condition of enrolment, parents are also expected to support the policy ensuring their child(ren) is dressed in the correct uniform and wearing it correctly when they leave the house, or car. For students who choose to wear their PE uniform on a day when they do not have PE, Health or Drama, they can expect to be issued with an After-School Detention the next school day. Jewelry items in breach of the uniform policy will be confiscated and only returned to a parent.

## Flinders Uni Visit

A group of 15 Senior School Students attended a visit to Flinders University on Fri 21 Aug. This was in lieu of attending the Open Day as most universities did not run physical Open Days this year due to COVID-19 restrictions.

Once at the Bedford Park campus, the group was welcomed by three student ambassadors, Hugo, Clarry and Helen, who escorted us to a lecture theatre. At first, students were given an introduction by Access Project Officer Bex Johnson, presenting general information about university life and why students would choose to study at Flinders University.

Next, Hope Christian College students had the opportunity to ask questions of the student ambassadors. Hugo was a medical student who began his pathway through studying medical science, Clarry was a student of Occupational Therapy and Helen was a Law student. Although the question time began slowly, it rapidly proceeded into a host of varied and relevant questions.

After that, students were escorted on a campus tour during a break in the weather, which ended at the Plaza. Here students were given the opportunity to eat lunch and take a break. After lunch, students were presented with an entertaining workshop entitled 'Psych Out', where various branches of psychology were outlined and our powers of observation were tested.
